
MESSAGE FROM THE EAST


JAIME SODUSTA WORSHIPFUL MASTER


Message from the South

Freemasonry

There is no simple, one-line definition that de-



- 1. It is a fraternity of men, bound together by oaths, based on the medieval stonemason craft guilds.
- 2. It teaches lessons of social and moral virtues based on symbolism of the tools and language of the ancient building trade, using the building of a structure as a symbol for the building of character in men.



- 3. Masons are obliged to practice brotherly love, mutual assistance, equality, secrecy, and trust between each other.
- 4. Masons have secret methods of recognizing each other such as handshakes, signs, and passwords.
- 5. Masons meet in lodges that are governed by a Master and assisted by Wardens, where applicants who are found to be morally and mentally qualified are admitted using secret ritual ceremonies based on the legends of the ancient guilds.
- 6. It is not a religion, and it has no religious dogma that it requires. Masons must simply believe in the existence of a Supreme Being, whatever they conceive that deity to be. Their personal beliefs are just that: personal.
- 7. It is not a science, but it does teach its members to value learning and experience. It encourages Masons to think but does not tell them what to think.
- 8. Freemasonry teaches masons to be tolerant of the beliefs of others and to regard each man as their equal, deserving both their respect and assistance.





A Holiday Wish – Why not me?

As the holidays approach, there's a sense of magic in the air. If you were to open a package from a loved one on the special day of the season, and in it were a small glass jar, of ornate craftsmanship, and it was slightly charred by ash, so you rubbed it to clean it before opening it, and out emerged a genie that could grant you three wishes – what would they be? More time? An easier time – or a more fun time? More money, to make your existing time easier and more fun?

Every such tale of genies granting wishes turns out to be a cautionary one. All too often, the things wished for end up being curses in their own twisted way. So, here's a wish we can all ask for instead – no genie required: "why not me?"

Too often, we succumb to self-doubts when faced with difficult or daunting tasks. We might tell ourselves – the competition is so much better prepared, better funded, better educated, they have a better pedigree, etc. Or we neglect to do that which is our duty because we tell ourselves, "I don't have time – someone else will take care of it."

In both of these situations, we should ask ourselves — "why not me? Why shouldn't I take first place in that contest? Why shouldn't you get that promotion, or whatever else it is you're striving for? This holiday season is especially magical for me, because in November, while vacationing in Fiji, the State Bar of California published the results of the July 2022 examination — and my name was on the list. This was a dream I'd been chasing since at least 2006, when I first started attending law school, but realistically, more like 1997, when I first started taking my pre-law courses as an undergraduate. Seven times over the course of thirteen years I sat through the agony known as the California Bar Exam. A quarter of a century chasing a dream, finally achieved.

I had zero expectations of passing this time. Because over time, I'd almost accepted my fate – that it just couldn't be me. That it just wasn't in the cards for me. But that voice was wrong. My other voice – the one that said, just give it one more try – you got this! That one was right. I still can't hardly believe it.

But would I have the same sense of amazement if I hadn't struggled so hard to achieve it? Probably not. It's that way with many things in life. The struggle is where the value is found. The journey is the destination. Just as in masonry – you get out of it what you put in. Your lodge gets out of you what you put in. So don't wish for an easier time or assume someone else will do the heavy lifting if you're not there. Ask yourself, why not me? That's how you can be your own genie, and make your wishes come true.

SB RiteCare is a speech and language center, one of the 170 across the U.S. located in downtown Santa Barbara. We can't thank our local Scottish Rite Masons enough for helping us with our mission. We provide speech and language therapy to preschool children at no cost. We also help elementary children who struggle in reading. Over the summer, we have Camp Chit Chat which is a summer therapy program for *children* with communication disabilities.

Every year, we help over 100 children! We have two speech-language pathologists on staff (Julie & Summer). We just had our December Wreaths for RiteCare fundraiser where we raised \$10,000!
